My experience in tennis and participation in a comedy competition have changed the course of my life and how I view the world.

I have received a trophy only once in my whole life as a singles tennis player. People say it was just once or too late because it was the very last tournament for me, but I learned a very precious lesson from this experience: the great achievement comes with the great pain.

Although I had played tennis for ten years, I had been a loser. Most of the time, I lost. Generally, the longer you play tennis, the better you get. Unfortunately that didn't happen to me but to everyone else. In fact, it was not "unfortunate" but "natural" that I couldn't get a title because I obviously didn't make any effort. I was such a quitter who ran away from everything painful and hard. When I realized this, I changed myself. I decided to believe in the power of making effort for the first time in ten years. I established two things to do every single day: waking up every morning at 5 a.m. to clean the entrance of my house, and doing the additional training menu that I made just for myself after tennis practice. Those were all for quitting to be "quitter". I literally did all of those things everyday regardless of how bad my condition was.

In my last game as a tennis player, I finally won a high school championship in men's singles. I still remember the moment I received the trophy as a singles tennis player. Although it was made of cheap plastic, for me it did feel heavy somehow because I learned very valuable lesson about importance of making effort.

Another experience that irrevocably changed my life is the national high school comedy competition that I participated with my friend in Japan. This is the competition of "Manzai", unique Japanese comedy style performed by two people. I am proud that we went

up to the semi-final because I gained very valuable insight which dispelled my lack of confidence in my comedy. Until this competition, we only had shown our comedy to the people in high school, so I wasn't sure if I was truly funny. In this competition, however, people who were laughing were not those I knew. They were laughing at the things I thought was funny. This experience actually took away something hanging in my heart weirdly for a long time, and now I have some confidence that I am capable of making people laugh.

These two experience look irrelevant, but without any of these, I wouldn't be dreaming about a movie director. I wouldn't even be writing these statements in this country. Those two confidences led me to this United States and allow me to pursue my big dream with stable faith.
